

As the excitement built, the tornado spirit grew stronger. This spirit made 1985-86 a fun-filled school year with everyone aware of the TORNADO WATCH!!




















Just as tornadoes grow in strength, academics too, can get strong and powerful and build up the school instead of tearing it down.






excellent to five poor. Several solos also taken to this competition.

in at least three public performances, usually evening concerts, and in additional various assemblies for the student body.



The squad was very young this year, and will only be losing one senior, so next year they should have a larger group and do well, Sponsor Darrel Harbaugh said.





Although working on the newspaper was hard work most staff members enjoyed it.


"Working on the paper is hard but fun," said Junior Jennifer Groh. "Tornado Times is a great way to get to know the school, the students, the faculty and the community."

we paste up all of the items. I think we had a good staff this year," continued Holmes, "and I think it will be reflected in the book."





Y.B.T.P., P.P.C.E., and proctoring all enabled students to become involved in activities and perhaps careers outside their regular field of experience.














or "lengua," it provided a learning experience which helped the students reach the same goal.















SEK Vo-tech: "hands on" learning

As one walks out the west side doors of McFarland was superintendent, Coffeyville Vocational-Technical School.

The SEK Vo-Tech, originally named McFarland Trade School, was built in 1938. The school was named after Kenneth W. McFarland, who was superintendent of USD 445 from 1935 to 1941 and organized the project of building a trade

From 1941 to the present, the Vo-Tech has remained independent from the USD-445 school district.




SPORTS













It was the second consecutive year for the girls to win the Altamont tournament. At this tournament Ramona Matthews took away the Most Valuable Player award home again, as she did the year before.


Matthew's said "This year was very experiencing year for us all. We had close games, but we played as a team and came through."


Four seniors, Lorna Briggans, Penny Schulz, Tracey Ellison, and Rhonda Neis, showed leadership.

Coach Mark Chance said, "Parsons deserve to go to state, but so did we. Our league had real good teams this year; everyone of them should have gone to state."


According to Matthews, "Our leaders were really coach Crandell and Coach Chance, but the Seniors were there when we really needed them. Especially Tracey Ellison."


Grapplers take six to state













Using his leg power, Senior Mike Martin holds his opponent to the mat.









Buckner swam on both relays in the state meet and was barely out touched in the 100 free leaving him with a time of :49.06 placing second in the event and holding a new school record.













"Like any other team we had our downs as well as our ups, but overall it was a pleasant and enjoyable year."







first in number one doubles.


In head-to-head competition the netters were undefeated. Coach Watson was very proud of this achievement.






Freshman Kristie Fields was fourth in the 100 meter dash, with a time of 12:50, a new school record. She was also a regional champion.




Almost there, Jr. Tosha Hoy approaches the finish line.

The baseball team had a hard hitting season, breaking away with only a 1-13 record.



"At the start of the season we played very poorly; near the end of the season our game improved by 100%," said Owen, "Our six seniors did outstanding jobs of being leaders."










"On the ball" is Senior Ron Compton as he makes the throw from third base to get the runner out at home.

Tracksters trek trail to state






Beating Indy, Senior Tony Battitori steps over the hurdles with ease.








This year, the club had about 30 members. Miss Peri Van Tassle, sponsor, said, "The club this year was more enthusiastic. All together, it was a better club."

People do not like to be reminded of tragedy and sadness, but sometimes unhappiness must be noted to assure all of us how precious and valid every human life truly is.




"There was a lot of good in him; he really cared about people," she said.


