

BIBLIOGRAPHICAL FORMAT

A bibliography is a written list of materials used as sources for a particular topic. This compilation is arranged in alphabetical order and includes specific pieces of information. Although several different methods are acceptable when writing a bibliography; the samples below are the acceptable standards at Huntington Middle School.

BOOK-with an author

Author's last name, Author's first name. Title of Book. Place of publication: Publisher, date of publication.

Example: Dickmeyers, Lowell. Skateboarding Is For Me. Minneapolis: Lerner Publishing Company, 1978.

BOOK-with an editor

Editor's last name, Editor's first name, ed. Title of Book. Place of publication: Publisher, date of publication.

Example: Kesting, Theodore, ed. The Outdoor Experience. New York: Barnes and Co., 1984.

AUDIO CASSETTE, LASER DISC, OR VIDEO CASSETTE

Title of Cassette or Disc. (Type of reference.) Place of publication: Publisher, date of publication.

Example: Tropical Rainforest. (Laser disc.) Denver, Colorado: Lumivision, 1992.

CD ROM

"Article Title." Name of CD ROM, (CD ROM). Place of publication: Publisher, date of publication.

Example: "Carnivores." Mammals: A Multimedia Encyclopedia, (CD ROM). Washington, D.C.: National Geographic Society, 1993.

COMPUTER PROGRAM

Title of Computer Program. Place of publication: Publisher, date of publication.

Example: Grammar Games. Torrance, California: Davidson, Inc., 1995.

ENCYCLOPEDIA ARTICLE

"Article Title." Name of Encyclopedia, volume number, date of publication, page numbers.

Example: "George Washington Carver." Encyclopedia Britannica, Volume 20, 1983, pages 244-246.

MAGAZINE ARTICLE

Author's last name, Author's first name. "Article Title." Name of Magazine, volume number, date of publication, page number.

Example: Axthelm, Pete. "Money, Manner, and Tennis." Newsweek, volume 48, July 14, 1983, page 82.

INTERNET RESOURCES

Author's last name, Author's first name. "Title of Work." Title of Complete Work.

Address of website (date of message or visit).

Example: Library of Congress. "Today-2,000 Years Later." Scrolls From The Dead Sea: The Ancient Library of Oumran and Modern Scholarship.
