
### Frozen Yogurt in the Student Store?



### Cars That Drive Themselves

A project started by Google, driverless cars are not far from the future. In the United States 30,000 people die from automobile accidents every year, so driverless cars will hopefully reduce that statistic massively.

The cars drive rather slow though, up to only 25 miles per hour. Its technology is rather simple, too. "The cars use a mixture of 3D laser-mapping, GPS, and radar to analyze and interpret their surroundings, and the latest versions are fully electric with a range of about 100 miles. The radar is interesting because it allows the car to see through objects, rather than relying on line-of-sight. At one point during our drive the car recognized and halted for a cyclist who was concealed behind a row of hedges."

Currently, testing for driverless cars on public roads is legal in four states: Michigan, Florida, Nevada, and California. With the technology still being in its infancy, the driverless cars learn from other driverless cars and most possess about 40 years of driving experience. It really is rather amazing, and the Google founder Sergey Brin stated that the Google Self-Driving car will be available to the public somewhere between 2017-2020.

With that in mind, do you think driverless cars are a good idea, why or why not? The future is now, and even though we don't have flying cars now- artificial intelligence is rising and who knows, maybe we will have flying cars (or even better) someday.


behind the curtain and played many friendly games.

If you had the chance to go to another planet, but knew you could never return to Earth, would you go? Two-hundred thousand people applied to do exactly that, to participate in the first Mars exploration by humans. The project is called Mars One, their goal is to establish a permanent human settlement on planet Mars. Starting in 2024, they will (most likely) be sending out crews of four every two years.

Out of the two-hundred thousand of those who applied, only 100 people made it to the final cut. After training, Mars One will select 24 final candidates to actually be sent off on a one-way trip to Mars. Don't think of this trip in a pessimistic way though, as these candidates want to be the first people to *live* on Mars, not die.

What makes this a one-way trip, though? For starters, the journey will be very long and extremely isolated. Hemet High School has been selected as one of only five schools in the nation to be awarded a new technology grant for a Cell Phone Blocking tower.

The tower will look like a huge tree (image) and will be located just outside the back area of the school by where the old portables were. That way, the interference from the tower should not disrupt the houses in the nearby

area. The tower will create an umbrella, if you will, over the entire campus and with the emerging technology, can be pinpointed to distance and coverage.

What the technology on the towers will do is jam all cell phone transmissions for cells phones when turned on.



Not only can it be turned on and off, but it can be timed so that when students are in class time, no cell phones can be used to retrieve or transmit data, making them useless during classes. During passing periods, the cell tower will release all the data so students can send and receive their texts, files and calls, checking in on all their Twitter, Instagrams, Pinterest, Facebook, etc.



Even staff will not be able to use their phones unless they register their personal phones Media Access Control (MAC) number with the district. There has been talk that students who have good grades and no attendance issues will be able to register their MAC number and be granted access during school but they will need an administration or teacher approval to even apply.

As a pilot school, our results will be looked at to see if the program should move forward within the district, county, state and even nation wide. Aren't we the lucky ones? \*AFS
