

Teaching School-Wide Expectations Hallway Lesson Plan

Step 1: *Identify the expected behavior.*

Ready	Respectful	Responsible

Step 2: *Rationale for Teaching the Rule*

Lead students in a discussion – guide them toward the above expected behaviors using the following prompt:

- “Students learn about always being ready, respectful, and responsible at MWES. Being ready always means being prepared. Being respectful always means being polite and cooperative. Being responsible means being dependable and trustworthy. Tell me what “Respectful, Responsible, and Ready look, feel, or sound like in the hallway.”

Step 3: *Identify a Range of Examples*

<i>Positive Teaching Examples</i>	<i>Negative Teaching Examples</i>
<p>Choose a couple of students to “show” examples of following the expectations.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Respectful – Have 2-3 students show examples of the hallway expectations for being respectful. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Examples: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Students are being silent, so they don’t bother other classes. ○ Hands are by their side or behind their back. ○ They are listening for teacher directions. • Give the example students a few directions to follow around the classroom (ex. turn left, wait at the door, etc.) 2. Responsible – Have 2-3 students show examples of the hallway expectations for being responsible. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Examples: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Students are paying attention to staying with their class. ○ Walking on the right side. ○ Going quickly to their destination. 3. Ready – Have 2-3 students show examples of the hallway expectations for being ready. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Examples: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Students are walking with their class. ○ If a student is in the hall without their class, they have a hall pass. 	<p>Teacher demonstration of non-examples of following expectations (See video on J:// Drive).</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Respectful – Identify the non-examples of not being respectful. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Examples: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Students are talking and playing in the hall. ○ Ignoring teacher directions. ○ Tearing up the bulletin boards by running hand on the wall. 2. Responsible – Identify the examples of not being responsible in the hallway. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Examples: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Students are turned around not paying attention in line. ○ Walking on the left side of the hall – running into people. ○ Wasting their time by walking slowly and not hurrying to their destination. 3. Ready - Identify example of not being ready in the hall <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Examples: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Falling out of line. ○ Leaving classroom without your hall pass.

Step 4: *Practice/Role Playing Activities*

1. Have all students line up on the right side of the hallway and have them walk down a hallway and back, with the teacher monitoring.
 - Call attention to positive behaviors (students who are following expectations).
2. Debrief with students any questions. “Are there any questions you have about using respectful, responsible, and ready behavior in the hallway?”

Step 5: Prompt/Remind Expected Behavior

1. Call attention to the positive behaviors of students following expectations.

- Examples:

- “I like the way <Insert Student Name> is keeping their voice at Level 0.”
- “Thank you <Insert Student Name> for paying attention and keeping our line moving.”
- “Be sure to have a hall pass when you’re in the hall.”
- “Remember, enjoy bulletin boards with your eyes.”
- “Classes are learning. Let’s be respectful of their learning.”
