


## Neil Wade '14 speaks at the Invest in Hope Luncheon about the value of a St. Elizabeth education

# Annual Auction and Crab Feed



# Service at St. Elizabeth High School

As part of our commitment to Catholic Social Teaching, students engage in Christian service projects throughout the year. Here are a few examples of the ways in which student serve their community.

## Seniors & Second Graders Become Unlikely Friends

**H**igh school students and elementary school students do not seem to get along to most people. However, Saint Elizabeth seems to throw that notion into the water. The Saint Elizabeth High School Creative Writing class, which is composed of all seniors, developed a project to visit and “buddy” with the second grade class at Saint Elizabeth Elementary School.

At first, the project did not seem very interesting. The seniors expected an enlarged version of babysitting, with loud rambunctious kids throwing Play-Doh across the room and screaming at each other. However, after the first visit, the high school students and the second graders bonded with each other. A bond so great, that neither class wanted to part.

With every visit, the buddies learned more about each other.



The high school students and second graders both learned from each other, in more ways than one. Second grader, Breanna, learned great values from her buddy Stephanie, “My buddy [Stephanie] teaches me how to act. Like she teaches me not to fight with other people, and how to get along with people... I would like to do this again next year.” Another second grader David seems to aspire to be like his buddy, “My buddy is Dhruv... we learned what a fact was and what an opinion was. Dhruv is awesome and I would want to be like him because he is cool...”

Both the seniors and second graders look forward to their time together working on assignments, and learning from each other. According to the second grade teacher, Mrs. Sacco, her students really enjoy it, “My kids look forward to it every week. They are excited about each activity we do, whether it’s writing or science. Their most favorite thing was when the seniors wrote stories with their second grade buddy in the story... the seniors are such good role models...” What started as a small project became an on-going learning experience, which shows that with any age, comes fun and knowledge. Good job, Saint Elizabeth!

## Social Justice Projects

This year, the senior religion class has developed a series of social justice projects that students work on in small groups with the assistance of JVC volunteer, Joanna Barlow (see article about Joanna on page 10). The projects include crocheting hats and scarves for those in need, distributing meals to the homeless, and raising awareness about bullying. As one student mentioned, "We know that we will not be changing the world, but our project will have a strong impact in our community and hopefully it will show and motivate other people in our community to do something similar to help out people who truly need it."



## Students Provide a Listening Ear for Mercy Center Residents

This winter, students visited residents at Mercy Center and interviewed them about their life stories. Student learned the value of service even when it means stepping outside of one's comfort zone. As one student mentioned, "I'm not going to lie. I was pretty nervous at first... but when I sat down I automatically felt comfortable and it was like talking with someone my age."

Jasmine Malone, '14 reflected on her conversation with the 90-year-old woman with whom she was paired, "She was very happy we were there because she feels like the youth of today [are] very disconnected from the elderly people in our community. When I sat down next to her she had a huge smile on her face."

## Boys Basketball Team Builds a Strong Foundation for Success

## Greg Short Combines His Passion, Social Media, and Philanthropy to Raise Funds for St. Elizabeth

*On February 8, 2014 Greg Short participated the Tour de Palm Springs. He used the event to host an online fundraising campaign for St. Elizabeth High School. In this interview he shares his motivations, challenges, and successes with hosting an online fundraising campaign.*

### **Why did you decide to do a fundraiser for St. Elizabeth High School?**

My introduction to Saint Elizabeth came through my partner, Ray Souza, who is a graduate of Saint Elizabeth. Through crab feeds, and attending Circle of Friends dinners, I saw first hand the caliber of students Saint Elizabeth produced. I was so impressed with what I saw. I felt what I think a lot of people feel, "what can I do to help? I'm only one person." I was looking for a way that I could contribute and give back to the community.

### **What was the fundraiser?**

I used to be a marathon runner. When my knees could no longer take the pounding, I started looking for a replacement. I bought an inexpensive bike, and started cycling. I loved it! Within a few weeks I started training for my first Gran Fondo. And with that I thought, why not do it as a fundraiser? With that ride I raised \$1875 for Saint Elizabeth. This year I set a goal of \$2500, and I raised \$2730. I am so grateful to everyone that not only contributed financially toward my goal, but also those that supported me in other ways.

I think there are a lot of people who want to give back but think, 'I'm only one person. What can I do?' Let me tell you, one person can do a lot. There are a lot of people who are looking for ways to help. In many cases, all you have to do is ask.

I knew I wanted to do another fundraiser for Saint Elizabeth. I started looking for a ride that I thought would be fun, or interesting, which is when I



found Tour De Palm Springs. After I made up my mind to ride, I started looking for a website through which I could raise money, where the majority of money raised would go directly to the charity. Through a Google search I found Hunter Ziesing at the Charity of Choice Foundation, [www.mycharityof-choice.com](http://www.mycharityof-choice.com). Charity of Choice collects a 4.95% administrative fee for each contribution made. That is the lowest that I have found. On top of that the founders of the foundation are personally involved and incredibly responsive.

After finding Charity of Choice, I established a goal for myself. I wanted to raise more than last year, so I set a goal of \$2500. After that I emailed all of my family, friends, and co-workers, asking them for whatever they felt comfortable with contributing. I also put it on Facebook.

### **Were there any challenges along the way?**

The biggest challenge for me was finding time to train in the middle of winter, with shorter days, and the holidays. I went into the ride not as prepared as I would have liked. I considered not riding, but I really felt like I made a commitment to those


that supported me. I ended up finishing a full hour faster than I planned. The ride was amazing. There were 9,000 cyclists! Some were riding for charities, but many were not. My ride could not have been better.

### **What advice would you give to someone interested in hosting an online fundraiser?**

My advice would be, don't be afraid. If you are passionate about something go after it. If you find an activity you enjoy, you can easily turn it into a fundraiser, by yourself or with a group. There are so many ways to raise money: sending out emails, social media, holding a car wash, reaching out to restaurants, going to farmers markets and ask people to help. Along with that there are resources available to you that make the process easy, like My Charity of Choice. I can't say enough about them.

I have not yet determined my next fundraiser, but there will be another very soon. I would be happy to work with anyone who is looking to get started. I am also up for riding with anyone who wants to head out for a bike ride! One other thing, even though my ride has already happened, people can still contribute at <https://mycharityofchoice.com/campaign/profile/542#.UxlUQZK9KSM>. Better yet, you can find your own ride, 5k, 10k, or half marathon, and start your own fundraiser!

I hope that the service-learning program continues to grow so that more students are able to work together to serve others and reflect on the experience in class."

Joanna's time at St. Elizabeth High School has been a blessing to the students and staff who benefit from her support, "I am so grateful to have been welcomed into the SEHS community since I started in December. ## Sister Ellen Mary Cunningham, OP '35, "Missions accomplished"

**O**n January 8th, 2014, Sister Ellen Mary completed her journey on this earth and peacefully went home to God surrounded by her loving sisters. For 78 years, Sister had been a Dominican Sister of Mission San Jose; she died at 96 years of age. As a Dominican novice, Sister became so ill everyone thought she would never reach her next birthday. Sister fooled everyone!

One of 10 children, Sister was a graduate of Saint Elizabeth Elementary and High School. After her entrance into religious life, she was renamed "Sister Amabilis," and studied for many years. During her early years, Sister served as a successful teacher and principal of several schools throughout California. Sister was superior of Saint Catherine's Military School in Anaheim, during which time she was responsible for building a new administration wing for the school.

Following her teaching career, financial expertise and "thinking outside the box" were gifts that Sister Ellen Mary shared most generously. As treasurer for the entire community, Sister enrolled the Congregation in social security in the early 70's,

and facilitated the purchase of health insurance which helped the sisters to a more sound financial footing.

During this period, 1967 to 1986, she also spent some summers in Mexico helping the Province with their financial situation and also a building project in Mexico. In Mission San Jose, Sister Ellen Mary oversaw two buildings, was a leader for the local Chamber of Commerce, and was active in the National Associations of Religious Treasurers.

During her whole life as teacher, principal, and financial leader, Sister Ellen Mary was concerned for justice in every facet of life. She had an unfailing sense of humor and was always interested in others. A quotation next to her graduation picture for the class of '35 epitomized Sister's cheery outlook, "As merry as the day is long!"

Thank you, Sister Ellen Mary, missions accomplished. You have earned eternal rest with our loving God!
