#### SWEETWATER COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT #2 TESTING

Sweetwater County School District #2 participates in two major tests during each school year of which Home School Students can take part in. The PAWS, a state administered standardized test and the MAP, a computerized achievement level test.

Proficiency Assessments for Wyoming Students (PAWS) is a new and unique assessment system developed by the Wyoming Department of Education in cooperation with Harcourt Assessment, Inc. The instructionally supportive design of PAWS presents a palette of information focusing on individual student growth and performance. Assessments in PAWS will include reading, writing and math; and in 2006 science will be added.

The design provides information for teachers to make instructional decisions regarding their students throughout the school year. This allows re-teaching within specific standards focused upon concepts where students need additional opportunities for success. In order to accommodate the dialogue of students, teachers and parents about student learning the results will be available within one month of testing.

Writing will be scored by trained and certified Wyoming teachers. Scoring of the math and reading items will be performed by Harcourt Assessment, Inc. The science assessment is being developed under the guidance of teachers, administrators and University of Wyoming participants to fit into the same instructionally supportive design used throughout PAWS.

If you choose to participate in this test the District will be in contact with you prior to testing to set up the time and place.

## **Home Schooling**

Home Schooling, as provided for in Enrolled Act 94, 1985, is recognized by Sweetwater County School District No.2 as an alternative to attending public or private school, with the following stipulations, as provided by law.

- 1. Every parent, guardian or other person having control or charge of any child within the District required by law to attend school, but who intends to educate his/her children in a home-based educational program shall be required to demonstrate to the District that their program provides a basic academic educational program as defined by law appropriate to the educational level of each child.
  - 2. Compliance with the foregoing section may be accomplished by providing evidence to the Superintendent or designee that:
- (a) The parent has enrolled the child or has purchased a correspondence program with an agency that regularly provides curriculum materials for home schools such as Christian Liberty Academy, Accelerated Christian Education, Basic Education, or other similar programs appropriate to the educational level of the child. Similar does not imply that the program must be religious in nature.
  - (b) The parent will be providing by other means a sequentially progressive curriculum of fundamental instruction as defined by statute, appropriate to the educational level of the child.
- 3. Compliance is required prior to the time that any child misses attendance at the schools provided by the District. Each parent will be required to complete a special form on his/her Home-Based Educational program prior to school starting each fall. Failure to attend the District's schools or other private school without compliance will be deemed as unexcused absence.
- 4. It is not the policy of this District to interfere with or dictate the method or means of instruction in a home based educational program, but only to be assured that any home-based educational unit operated within the District is providing a basic academic educational program to resident children of compulsory attendance age.
  - 5. Nothing in this policy is intended to exempt any home-based educational unit from the statutory requirements that it be in session during the entire time that the District's schools are in session.
- 6. The District regards home-based educational units as non-accredited schools and reserves the right to require appropriate testing or to use any other means it deems appropriate for testing or to use any other means it deems appropriate for placement in a grade level of any student entering the District's schools from a home-based educational program, whether or not the grade level corresponds with the level achieved by the student in the home-based educational unit.

# **Graduation Requirements**

Graduation requirements will meet or exceed the minimum standards set by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and by the Wyoming Department of Education.

Effective with the class of 2006 and beyond, a minimum of twenty-four (24) credits will be required for graduation. Of these, four (4) must be in English, three (3) in social studies to include history, american government, and economic systems and institutions, three (3) in mathematics, three (3) in science, one (1) in physical education, and one/half (1/2) in health. In addition, nine and one-half (9 ½) elective credits must be earned to accumulated twenty-four (24) total credits. In order to have the opportunity to meet the transcript endorsement requirements as outlined in Wyoming State Statute (W.S. 21-2-304 & W.S. 21-9-101), it is strongly suggested that of the 9 ½ elective credits earned, that they included courses in Career/Vocational Education, Fine and Performing Arts, and Foreign Language. Effective with the class of 2011 and beyond, Expedition Academy students must successfully complete ½ credit of community service.

In addition to completing the required credits a student needs to successfully demonstrate proficiency in performance standards as described in the Sweetwater County School District No. 2 Body of Evidence, in Wyoming State Statutes (W.S. 21-2-304 & W.S. 21-9-101) and in Chapter 31 of the Wyoming State Rules and Regulations.

A high school diploma shall provide for one of the following endorsements, which shall be stated on the transcript of each student:

- A) Advanced endorsement requires a student to demonstrate advanced performance in a majority (5 of 9) of the areas of the common core of knowledge and skills specified under W.S. 21-9-101(b), and proficient performance in the remaining areas of the specified common core of knowledge and skills.
- B) Comprehensive endorsement requires a student to demonstrate proficient performance in all areas of the common core of knowledge and skills specified under W.S. 21-9-101(b).
- C) General endorsement requires a student to demonstrate proficient performance in a majority of the areas (5 of 9) of the areas of the common core of knowledge and skills specified under W.S. 21-9-101(b.

To receive a High School diploma from Sweetwater County School District No. 2, a student must attend high school for at least seven semesters.

Students, who have not demonstrated proficiency in 5 of the 9 content areas may be referred to the graduation review panel.

In accordance with law, no diploma or credit for a course which has been completed successfully shall be denied a pupil who has earned it, provided such diploma or credit shall not be deemed earned until payment has been made for all indebtedness due to the school district.

Sweetwater County School District #2 will award a certificate of attendance to special needs students who have been enrolled throughout the completion of their Individual Educational Plan (IEP) or through age twenty-one as long as identified students are unable to meet academic rigor due to a documented disability and are unable to show proficiency in five of nine content standards.

### ARTICLE 1. COMPULSORY ATTENDANCE

### § 21-4-101. Definitions.

- (a) For the purposes of this article:
- (i) "Unexcused absence" means the absence, as defined in the policies of the local board of trustees, of any child required by this article to attend school when such absence is not excused to the satisfaction of the board of trustees by the parent, guardian, or other person having control of such child;

(ii) "Habitual truant" means any child with five (5) or more unexcused absences in any one (1) school year;

- (iii) "Private school" is any nonpublic, elementary or secondary school providing a basic academic educational program for children and may include parochial and church or religious schools and home-based educational programs;
- (iv) "Parochial, church or religious school" is one operated under the auspices or control of a local church or religious congregation or a denomination established to promote and promulgate the commonly held religious doctrines of the group though it may also include basic academic subjects in its curriculum. Nothing contained in w.S. 21-4-102(b), 21-2-401 or 21-2-406 grants to the state of Wyoming or any of its officers, agencies or subdivisions any right or authority to control, manage, supervise or make any suggestions as to the control, management or supervision of any parochial, church or religious school;
- (v) A home-based educational program means a program of educational instruction provided to a child by the child's parent or legal guardian or by a person designated by the parent or legal guardian. An instructional program provided to more than one (1) family unit does not constitute a home-based educational program;
- (vi) "Basic academic educational program" is one that provides a sequentially progressive curriculum of fundamental instruction in reading, writing, mathematics, civics, history, literature and science. These curriculum requirements do not require any private school or home-based educational program to include in its curriculum any concept, topic or practice in conflict with its religious doctrines or to exclude from its curriculum any concept, topic or practice consistent with its religious doctrines. ### § 21-4-102. When attendance required; exemptions.

- (a) Every parent, guardian or other person having control or charge of any child who is a resident of this state and whose seventh birthday falls on or before September 15 of any year and who has not yet attained his sixteenth birthday or completed the tenth grade shall be required to send such child to, and such child shall be required to attend, a public or private school each year, during the entire time that the public schools shall be in session in the district in which the pupil resides; provided, that the board of trustees of each school district may exempt any child from the operation of this article when:
- (i) The board believes that compulsory attendance in school would be detrimental to the mental or physical health of such child or the other children in the school; provided, the board may designate at the expense of

the district a medical doctor of its choice to guide it and support it in its decision:

- (ii) The board feels that compulsory school attendance might work undue hardship. The board may conduct a hearing on issues pursuant to this paragraph by executive session; or
- (iii) The child has been legally excluded from the regular schools pursuant to the provisions of w.S. 21-4-306.
- (b) A home-based educational program shall meet the requirements of a basic academic educational program pursuant to w.S. 21-4-101(a)(vi). It shall be the responsibility of every person administering a home-based educational program to submit a curriculum to the local board of trustees each year showing that the program complies with the requirements of this subsection. Failure to submit a curriculum showing compliance is prima facie evidence that the home-based educational program does not meet the requirements of this article.
