SCES Helps Out at the Food Bank

After completing Serrania's annual **November Food Drive** and delivering carloads of food to the West Valley Food Pantry, a group of Serranians trekked out to the Food Pantry on the day before Thanksgiving to take part in the next step in the process, which involved sorting and boxing the donated goods so they could be delivered to some of the 3,000 individuals served monthly by the local food bank. Twenty-five SCES volunteers worked alongside other community volunteers for three hours, helping to make sure the food donations were packed and ready to be distributed for Thanksgiving dinners.

Susan Steeb, food drive coordinator for the West Valley Food Pantry, noted her appreciation for SCES' effort: "So many of our clients are struggling with children, or they are senior citizens living on a very tight retirement. 

PRINCIPAL'S CORNER: A New Year Brings New Goals and Renewed Focus!

Beginning in January you will see a shift in math and writing instruction for the students at Serrania. Not only do we want to provide "Inspiration, Imagination, Innovation" for our students, but we want them to leave us ready for the future. The way we taught students in the past simply does not prepare them for the higher demands of college and careers today and in the future. Education is changing with the implementation of the new nation—wide Common Core State Standards (CCSS). No matter where you live in the United States, your child's education will be based on the same set of learning standards. These new standards are based on current 21st century expectations for what students need to know and be able to do when they graduate. Are you ready? Can you do the new 5th grade math? Here is sample problem that our 5th grade students will be expected to answer on the new assessments beginning in 2015.

Tony is buying a used car. He will choose between two cars. The table below shows information about each car.

Car	Cost	Miles Per Gallon (MPG)	Estimated Immediate Repairs
Car A	\$3200	18	\$700
Car B	\$4700	24	\$300

Tony wants to compare the total costs of buying and using these cars.

- · Tony estimates he will drive at least 200 miles per month.
- The average cost of gasoline per gallon in his area is \$3.70.
- Tony plans on owning the car for 4 years.

Calculate and explain which car will cost Tony the least to buy and use.

At Serrania will begin using Ready Common Core Math. Our instruction will focus teaching students to: think, model, explain, use language of the discipline and persevere in problem solving. We are increasing our project-based learning. Students can no longer rely on knowing the algorithm, they must know the how, why and be able to explain their reasoning. Thank you to Mrs. Sperber for introducing the curriculum and to Ms. Tenzer, Mrs. Arnesen, Mrs. Hakobian and Mrs. Rodstein for piloting.

A Little bit of background and the meaning of Joko....

Joko Togi is one of Serrania's newest and most enthusiastic teacher's assistants. Focusing his efforts in the computer lab, Joko's fun and patient teaching style has quickly made him a favorite among Serrania students. Joko, who was born in Indonesia and

raised in Taiwan, came to Los Angeles when he was 13 years old. And speaking 5 languages - Indonesian, Chinese, English, and a little bit of Spanish which he learned in High School in the states has definitely added to his diverse background. Joko is currently a student at CSUN studying to earn his teaching credential. And in answer to the most common questions he's asked, 'Joko' means "young man" in Indonesian... to which he adds with a smile; "Yes, that means I will never get old!"

What Does Joko Do At Serrania?

Joko arrivies early to open the Quedo gate where he manages the morning traffic and helps keep all our kids safe. In the computer lab, students practice their typing, learn how to use Microsoft Office and other programs, and also learn how to do research using educational websites. Joko also assists students participating in our highly successful *Accelerated Reader* program – helping them login, complete their tests, and get motivated to read more books! He also helps in the lab after school Monday through Thursday so parents and students can do even more work on *Accelerated Reader* or *Khan Academy*. In addition to his work in the computer lab, Joko also supervises the yard during recess and lunch to ensure student safety and security.

The best part of my job...

Joko came to Serrania because of his love of kids, his dedication to teaching and his determination to share the fun and challenge of working on computers. When asked what he enjoys most about being at Serrania, Joko reported that "the best part of my job is being surrounded by the world's most awesome students. They are the ones who make my job more meaningful and who make my days brighter and happier." Proof of that special connection came in a story that Joko shared; "Every time the kindergarteners say hi to me, they always say 'Hi, Mrs. Joko!' Displaying the great sense of humor that has made him popular with the kids, Joko admitted that he didn't mind it in the least and added; "I found that to be really cute. I guess I am really beautiful then!"

Having earned his plant manager certificate, Victor interviewed with 4 schools - and though he was offered a position at another school closer to his home, following his meeting with our Serrania administrators he turned them down, realizing that Serrania was the place for him!

A Day at Serrania...

Aside from managing the school grounds, Victor is responsible for ordering supplies and maintaining the various systems and structures around the school. Additionally, Victor never hesitates to step forward and help the teachers if there's something that needs to be fixed in their classroom. One of his favorite parts of the job is that each day presents a different challenge... things happen that he doesn't expect and he must constantly come up with new ideas or solutions. Victor shared that his days always go by extremely fast, and that he has never enjoyed a job so much!

The Best Part of the Job.....

The best part of the job is that no day is ever the same. Victor gets a great feeling of satisfaction knowing that he helps people every day and makes the school a better place. On most days, kids say "hi" and even offer him advice. "One day, a boy came up to me at lunch and mentioned that he had plucked some weeds out that were next to a new tree. He suggested I pluck out all the weeds or the tree will die since the weeds were stealing the water from the tree." Victor was amazed at how much the child knew. "The boy said he's been doing it for 7 years at home with his dad. I thought it was so funny how he went to all the trouble of explaining it to me!"

What You Should Know About E-Waste. What is E-waste?

E-Waste is defined as any consumer electronic equipment that has reached its 'end-of-life' or 'end-of-usage,' whether in full or non-working condition. That includes most electronics or electronic equipment with a cord or circuit board such as:



Computer Monitors, Television Sets, Printers, PC Systems, Laptops, Copiers, Scanners, Fax Machines, Toner Cartridges, PDAs, Tower Supplies, Main Frame Units, Networking Equipment, Mother Board Systems, VCR/VCD/DVD Players, Home Entertainment Systems, Landline and Cellular Phones, and Small Portable Devices. We also accept car batteries.

Why is this so important?

Electronic discards are one of the fastest growing segments of our nation's waste stream. 56% of American households have functional E-products that they no longer use. Less than 10% of E-waste is currently being properly dismantled or recycled. 70% of heavy metals and 40% of lead and mercury contents found in today's landfills come from E-waste. Help get rid of E-Waste the right way by keeping it out of our landfills and sending it to a proper recycling facility!

Children today face the same challenges with friendships that their parents faced, but the way children develop these relationships has changed. Children still want the same things out of their relationships; comfort, support, and trust. But technology has changed the way children interact. "Talking" on the phone usually means texting with a friend. This is extremely risky because it is so easy to share what another person texted or messaged. A single text or message can be shared over and over, taking social gossip beyond the realm of hearsay. Be proactive about these new realities with you and your children. Know what is happening in your children's lives and with their friends. They are learning how to build relationships and develop friendships.

And while your children may not do everything you ask, you can be sure they are watching and listening to everything you do. What are your relationships with your peers? Are you supportive and trustworthy? Or do you share information that a friend confided in you? Are you a 'Frenemy' and you don't even know it? 'Frenemies' are nothing new. When we were growing up we referred to them as 'two-faced': friendly one minute, but speaking badly about them the next. Help your children to understand the value of good relationships. Model for them how to be a good friend and ask questions about their friendships when you don't feel they are mutually beneficial. Children today still want the same thing that their parents wanted when they were growing up: to feel a sense of belonging and to fit in. Help your children learn the best ways to achieve healthy, reciprocal friendships.

A New Year's Resolution Worth Keeping!

Every parent, teacher and health care professional knows how important healthy eating habits are for our kids and its impact on their ability to perform at school every day. As a result, it should come as no surprise that parents' across the country use the tradition of the New Year to resolve to do a better job guiding their kids eating habits.

While many of us do a good job providing nutritious options at breakfast and dinner, lunch often proves a bigger challenge. To help you keep that "healthy lunches" resolution, I've pulled together some of my own experiences and real-world suggestions for creating healthier options for your hungry student.

Like many of you, Sunday nights at our house always seem to include visions of a week full of healthy lunches... a vision that includes the often unlikely reality of my kids eating those healthy lunches as well. Monday lunches are often ok, but by Tuesday all bets are off. We are busy and tired and frankly have very little time to deal with lunch!

This year can be different. Unlike my previous and unreasonable Sunday delusions of what to pack, this year I'm resolving to make more frequent smaller changes. Radical changes to kids meals will likely lead to open revolt. If it's going to last, it's time to

get real. To start with, I recommend by changing out a sugary boxed "juice" for water. Next, try hummus and vegetables in place of a pre-made boxed meal. Creamy tomato soup with whole grain crackers sounds warm and healthy. How about dinner leftovers in a thermos? Add a chopped fruit or vegetable and side of almond butter to dip, and you've not only created a healthier meal, but one they'll likely eat as well.

Change is hard, but remember this is not about the pressure of making the "best" lunch, but rather about making a better one.
