Every day, parents speak to me regarding their concerns about their child's social relationships at school. Every parent wants to know that their child has friends on the yard and in their classrooms. They wonder; "Who will my child play with?" "What if they don't have friends in their class?" All the natural concerns of caring parents... questions that, as a parent with kids still in school, I always take seriously.


At Serrania, our goal is to help develop students who have the ability, courage and confidence to build relationships in every situation. To know that no matter where they go, they will be able to easily meet new people and look at new or different situations as an opportunity to make new friends and grow. As part of our new SCES Life Skills Academy Toni Caruso, from the award winning 'Next Step' program came and spoke to teachers at the beginning of the school year outlining key behavior and manner skills that help students in their daily interactions with others. According to Toni, people often make decisions about 'who' you are in just the first few moments after they've meet. With her support, Serrania has already begun implementing a new school-wide manners program intended to help teach our students critical skills they can employ when speaking to others; including making eye contact, saying hello, goodbye, please, thank you and you're welcome.

To begin the year, we've been emphasizing the importance of 'eye contact.' Making and maintaining eye contact makes a person feel that they are being listened to, understood and appreciated. Today, distracted by TV, computers and other electronic devices, children are not interacting as they often did in the past, so it's important to teach and reinforce them so that all of our students learnd how to be respectful responsible in their interactions with others. Our 5th graders will be receiving additional interaction instruction through the highly successful 'Dancing Classrooms' program while our 4th graders will receive special attention through 'Next Step' lessons with Toni.

We expect that these special programs – together with our school-wide emphasis on building strong inter-personal skills – will help all of our students develop the confidence and tools they'll need to become the strong, self-assured adults we all wish they'll become.

We hope you'll join us by encouraging these behaviors at home, and welcome any comments or suggestions you have regarding this important initiative.

Believe it or not, it's back to school time! While it's always important to pack something healthy in our kids lunches, it is equally imperative to pack it safely – remember, it's not just "what" we offer but "how."

While the idea of the Fall semester conjures up images of sweaters, falling leaves, and warm colors, it's important to keep in mind that here in the West Valley, we're likely to be enjoying a beautiful Indian Summer for weeks to come... which means days of 90° + degree weather. These high temperatures present all of us with a number of challenges when it comes to preparing healthy and safe lunches for our kids.

In order to minimize food borne illness, it is important to reduce the time food spends in the "danger zone" $(41^{\circ} \text{ F} - 140^{\circ} \text{ F})$ F). Items such as meat, dairy products, and salads can be potentially dangerous if not maintained at the right temperature. Check out the USDA's *Choosemyplate.gov* for some great tips on keeping cold food cold and hot food hot. It is also a great idea to invest in an insulated lunch bag/box so you can add a cold pack or even a frozen water or juice to keep it cool.



"It makes you think of what is it you have done throughout school that leads you to the moment," said Elizabeth Jane Freeman, who left quite an impression on campus.

The previous Serrania student volunteered to paint a new Native American Chumash-themed mural on a classroom wall by the Quedo gate on the south side of campus by the school's Native American garden.

"I always thought of myself as an arts person but never thought I would be doing anything in art," she added. "I decided to do the mural because I went to school here and I thought it would be a great opportunity to give back."

She chose Seon Kyu as her assistant because she is her best friend, an illustration major and into creating landscapes and figures. Elizabeth is an abstract artist so the combination worked really well. Both met at Art Center College of Design in Pasadena. "This is something we have a passion for," Elizabeth added. "We got to have fun while giving back to a great school."

It took about three weeks for the pair to complete the mural.

Reflecting on the process to paint the mural together, Elizabeth said "you have to constantly step back and view the work in order to see the big picture because you are working in such small detail." "The building has a wall that is porous and you have to constantly be stippling (creating an image comprised of many small dots or specks). So it takes a lot longer because the paint doesn't just glide on. Physically, you have to keep going up and down (the ladder) and moving. It is very exhausting."

Elizabeth has many vivid memories about being a previous Serrania student. "I remember everything about this school. Even the smell, it still smells the same especially the library, the kitchen and the main office. All the memories just came back. To come back now actually makes me want to do more volunteer work. It sparked something in me."

Elizabeth also remembered building a (California) mission in Mr. Rindt's class. "I really wanted to make the building realistic and started adding plant material and explored creatively

how to make the foam model more dynamic. That was when I started growing more interested in art."

"One of the goals at Serrania is to build community; we give back," said Principal Wedaa while introducing Elizabeth and Seon Kyu at the first Friday morning school assembly of the year. "This is a place that is very important in her heart. During our school beautification day and on a few additional weekends, she and her assistant came and painted this gorgeous mural."

Elizabeth will graduate from Art Center next spring with a focus on fine art, sculpture, installation and video and strong interest in social media. "It's all about having fun and not forcing yourself onto something. If you are passionate about and love what you do, you will end up doing it and everything else is going to come from that," she said.

During Elizabeth's interview for this article at the mural, Ms. Sperber brought her class to experience it. While appreciating the artists' work, the colors and meaning of the mural, her students discussed the Native American Chumash, social studies, art and math concepts. The class explored how the mural grew from a small image into a building-sized painting by using ratios.




