The Mystery of Prayer

Over the past several weeks, I have received many cards, emails, and personal contacts



from students, family, friends, and colleagues telling me that they are praying for me. I know that many other people whom I do not know are also praying for me. Each time someone lets me know about their prayers, I feel very uplifted and surrounded in love. It has made me more mindful of prayer. There are many types of prayer and the one in which someone prays for another is called intercessory prayer.

The interest in prayer and its effectiveness seems to be a growing topic among people, both those who actively practice their faith and those who are not associated with any particular religion. In an article published in USA Today Anita Manning wrote that more than half of those who responded to a USA Today/ Stanford University Medical Center poll use prayer to control pain. Of those, 90% say it worked well, and 51% say it worked "very well." Among a dozen therapies, including bed rest, massage and herbal remedies, only prescription drugs were as successful as prayer in easing pain: 89% report that such drugs work well and 51% say they work "very well". In another research study conducted by Dr. Randolph Byrd, who practiced cardiology in San Francisco, it was reported that a group of patients who were prayed for did 10% better than a group who was not. In addition, the people who were prayed for were five times less likely to develop postsurgical complications and also died five times less often. Some writers argue for prayer to be considered as an alternative medicine. Another researcher attributes prayer effectiveness to quantum physics.

No matter how much it is researched or written about prayer, there will always be a mystery surrounding prayer as there is with faith. Some aspects cannot be quantified. We know God's answer to prayer may be different than we wish or expect. As a community of faith, it is important to continue to pray and know that our prayers are heard. We are God's heart and hands and the support that is given to each other is one way that we know God works in our world.


PPAS celebrates Poetry Month

Presbyterian Pan American School (PPAS), National Poetry Month is being celebrated for the second time. Senior students taking English IV class are getting familiar with diverse kinds of poetry, encompassing historical, humorous, romantic and even modern poetry. "We are celebrating poetry month because it is a tradition all over the U.S.A.," said Diane Garcia, Senior English IV teacher. "Poetry month gives the students an opportunity to think critically and express themselves. It also helps them with their grammar skills and to express orally." Garcia assigned poetry-related projects such as "poetry cake," which contains pieces of poetry focused on one specific theme and was practiced English IV students last year for the first time. Any student who is not a

member of Garcia's English class can also participate creating a variation of a poetry cake, which is often a "poetry cupcake." The second project is called "poetry in your pocket," which is about keeping your favorite poem in your pocket for a whole day and throughout the day reading it out loud to one or more persons. The second project was the one suggested by the National Poetry Foundation, which is in charge of encouraging students who attend schools in America to get involved with the literary form of poetry. Every year the foundation suggests a different way for students to share their favorite poems. "The idea of the project to get involved, to considered someone outstanding in the beauty of language," Garcia said. The official "poetry in your pocket" day at PPAS will be April 29. The students in



Garcia's class will pick any poem they like, from any author of their election, but if the poem is not originally written in English, it must be translated. The objective of "poetry in your pocket" is, as the National Poetry Foundation suggests, recite "poetry out loud." "We [English IV class] chose peace and war as a theme because we thought it was interesting," said Kenia Mascorro, senior. "The cake has poems from different poets

Month. including George Herbert and Anna Laetitia Barbauld." The students have practice their poetry on a daily basis, everything takes practice," Garcia said. "This project is fun because we get to use our creativity to put together an original cake," said Jesse Flores, senior. Garcia, who describes herself as fond of poetry, describes poetry as "a way to express your secret self by saying what you really think through someone else's words."

4. In what other activities are you involved in?





Members of PPAS' track team will advance to district

Presbyterian Pan American School's (PPAS) track team attended a meet on April 9 at West Oso High School. The 4x400 meter relay team of Junior Christian Ortiz, Senior Fernando Montemayor, Junior Erick Luna and Senior Hugo Aguilar placed second with a season best time and third overall behind two schools, Gregory Portland High School and Rockport-Fulton High School.

The 4x400 relay team of Junior Ivonne Mora, Senior Tania Rodriguez, Junior Ana Laura De Leon and Eaglet 2 Lizzette Paredes placed second. at the West Oso meet.

"They [track members] did ok in their times considering they took a week off for spring break," said Coach Reili Cantu. "For some students, they improved, for others, they were pretty close to where they have been."

It was the West Oso meet where Cantu determined who is going to represent PPAS in district, she said.

Currently, PPAS's 4x400 meter relay team of Ortiz, Montemayor, Luna and Aguilar are qualified in the región, based on their times, to be in the top five to go to district.

Senior Tania Rodriguez, Junior Ivonne Mora, Luna and Montemayor that compete in the 800-meter dash are ranked in the top 10 in región to advance to district and Ortiz who competes in the 300-meter hurdles, long lump and triple jump qualifies in the region to be in the top five.

Their performance and effort will show who will pass to disctrict, Cantu said. At the Ben Bolt meet on March 27, the PPAS track team participated in many events, such as 100, 200, 400, 800, 1600, 3200-meter, 100, 110-meter hurdles, 4x100, 4x200, 4x400 relays, high jump, long jump, triple jump, shot put, discus and also the throwers relay.

The track members participating in order, starting with the junior varsity's field event and the varsity eliminatories, then the varsity field event and the JV's finals and concluding with varsity finals.

"They are working hard," said Cantu," and their hard work is starting to show in their performance."

Ortiz won first place in the 300-meter hurdles, second place in long jump and third place in triple jump.

Ericka Campuzano, Eaglet II, placed third in the 3200-meter and sixth in the 1600-meter

"It was hard but in contrast with others, it was easier," Campuzano said,"I think that I'm giving my best."

It was very hard because the other school's students are very fast, but I liked it, said Eaglet II Chan Yeong Kim. Kim placed second in 200-meter dash and fourth in 100-meter dash.

The PPAS track team members have been working hard since January, Cantu said, and the next step would be district and regionals.

District is set for April 22 at Florence and only the top four places advance to regionals on April 30 in Florence as well.

"District will be harder than last year because four new schools are in our district that had a lot of succes in the past," Cantu said. "But I think that our team has more depth than last year," she said.
