Section 2: How to find a book in the Library

What are call numbers for?

Call numbers are the address of the book; they tell us where the book is located in the library. This library uses the Dewey Decimal System of Classification, named for Melvil Dewey.

There are **ten classes** of subjects, **000-999**, which are used for the **nonfiction** and **reference** sections of the library (*decimals are used for the subdivisions*).
