Section 2: How to find a book in the Library

What are call numbers for?

Call numbers are the <u>address of the book</u>: they tell us where the book is located in the library. This library uses the <u>Dewey Decimal System of Classification</u>, named for Melvil Dewey.

There are **ten classes** of subjects, **000-999**, which are used for the **nonfiction** and **reference** sections of the library (*decimals are used for the subdivisions*).

Section 3: Using the Library Catalog

The Library Catalog is a searchable list of all the books and materials in the library. It is important to understand HOW to best search for the material you need. Click on the appropriate icon after typing a search term in the FIND box.

If you know the author of a book, type in the author's name and click the icon "AUTHOR". If you only have a vague idea of a topic, do a KEYWORD search. If you know the TITLE of the book, type it in the FIND box and click "TITLE".



On the computer desktop **click** Library Catalog. You will then see the catalog screen with a **FIND** box. This is the main screen you will work from to answer the following questions.

After each question, return to this screen by clicking on Library Search in the left column or by clicking on the **breadcrumb** (a direct link that takes you back to the previous page) "Refine your search" located in the bar above the **FIND** box. You now have the option of doing a search by **KEYWORD** - this means that the computer searches for a specific word you want to look up.


