NASA Lego Robotics kits foster high-tech learning

Fifth graders at Union Elementary spent two weeks measuring, calculating, mapping, and programing. This might not sound like your typical day in an elementary classroom unless there are NASA Lego Robotics kits in the room. Students proved their programming skills by correctly measuring the circumference of their robot's wheel, navigating simple move forward motions and turning at a 90 degree angle to be eligible to run a 1 meter x 1 meter maze the student teams designed. The teams fabricated duct tape mazes with at least three obstacles involving turns. The students immensely enjoyed the integration of technology and the hands-on learning with the robots. While students refined their circumference calculations and designed a scale model of their maze, they were attending to Standards of Mathematical Practices of: Model with Mathematics and Attend to Precision. The Lego Robotics kits will be back at Union Elementary School in the spring for a 5th grade showdown of mathematical reasoning and perseverance through strenuous challenge.



This approach teaches the students to learn the spelling pattern rather than just memorizing the words for the test on Friday.

Parents of Hodgesville Elementary students were invited to school on August 29 to learn all about the new spelling program. The students showed their parents how to conduct a word sort. Parents had the opportunity to try out word sorts and see the differences from how they learned to spell.
