- town to which the ---shire regiment moved from Meryton, with Lydia following

- "If I can but see one of my daughters happily settled at Netherfield and all the others equally well married, I shall nothing to wish for."
- "I was very much flattered by his (Bingley's) asking me to dance a second time. I did not expect such a compliment."
- "Happiness in marriage is entirely a matter of chance...it is better to know as little as possible of the defects of the person with whom you are to pass your life."
- "Whatever I do is done in a hurry...and therefore if I should resolve to quit Netherfield, I should probably be off in five minutes."
- "I cannot forget the follies and vices of others so soon as I ought, nor their offenses against myself...My good opinion once lost, is lost forever."
- "That would be the greatest misfortune of all!—To find a man agreeable whom one is determine to hate."
- "Let me recommend you (Miss Bennet), as a friend, not to give explicit confidence to all Mr. Wickham's assertions; for as to Mr. Darcy's using him ill, it is perfectly false; for, on the contrary, he has been always remarkably kind to him, though George Wickham has treated Mr. Darcy in a most infamous manner...but really, considering Mr. Wickham's descent, one could not expect much better."

- “I have been so fortunate as to be distinguished by the patronage of the Right Honourable Lady Catherine de Bourgh...whose bounty and beneficence has preferred me to the valuable rectory of this parish, where it shall be my earnest endeavour to demean myself with grateful respect towards her Ladyship.”
- “A military life is not what I was intended for, but circumstances have now made it eligible. The church ought to have been my profession—I was brought up for the church, and I should at this time have been in possession of a most valuable living, had it pleased the gentleman we are speaking of just now (Darcy).”

- Who is “a sensible, gentlemanlike man, greatly superior to his sister, as well by nature as education”?
- Who says, “You are too sensible a girl, Lizzy, to fall in love merely because you are warned against it; and therefore, I am not afraid of speaking openly...Do not involve yourself or endeavor to involve him (Wickham) in an affection which the want of fortune would make so very imprudent”?
- What woman is Elizabeth describing? “I like her appearance...She looks sickly and cross. Yes, she will do for him very well. She will make him a proper wife.”
- Who says to Elizabeth, “So your sister is crossed in love, I find. I congratulate her. Next to being married, a girl likes to be crossed in love a little now and then. It is something to think of, and gives her a sort of distinction among her companions. When is your turn to come?”
- Who says, “I have told Miss Bennet several times, that she will never play really well unless she practices more;...she is very welcome...to come to Rosings every day, and play on the pianoforte in Mrs. Jenkinson’s room. She would be in nobody’s way...in that part of the house”?
- Who tells Elizabeth that Darcy “congratulated himself on having lately saved a friend from the inconveniences of a most imprudent marriage”?
- Who says, “In vain have I struggled. It will not do. My feelings will not be repressed. You must allow me to tell you how ardently I admire and love you”?
- Who says, “I had not known you a month before I felt that you were the last man in the world whom I could ever be prevailed on to marry”?
- Who is the person, that, having met Jane and Elizabeth returning from the Gardiners, “seldom listened to anybody for more than half a minute”?
- Who said, “My comfort is, I am sure Jane will die of a broken heart; and then he (Bingley) will be sorry for what he has done”?
