Field Kindley's vocal department offers opportunities for many students. Besides having a selective choral performing group, it has three beginning choirs to train students in vocal work.



The Field Kindley debaters had one of the best seasons for many years. The top ten won almost 100 more debates than they lost, the record standing at 182 victories over 84 defeats. The senior foursome of Bruce Hall, Charles Lynn, Jeff Weinberg, and Jerry Boles were outstanding in establishing 104 wins against but 20 losses. Paul Hodge and Jeff Weinberg started things off by winning a second place trophy at Fredonia. The week following, Weinberg and Fred Smoot went to the finals in the Winfield novice tourney while at the same time Lynn and Hall narrowly missed the semi-final rounds at Washington of K.C. Three weeks later Lynn and Hall won a first place trophy at the Topeka Highland Park tournament to highlight the year. Early in January the latter pair with Boles and Weinberg placed 7th out of 77 teams entered in the Emporia tourney, the largest in the history of Kansas. A week later Hall, Short, Boles, and Lynn qualified for the semi-finals at Shawnee Mission North in Kansas City in wins, but lost out on speaker points. The District Tournament was held in Coffeyville this year with CHS taking third. Defeating the three top teams 4-2, the locals had to "grin and bear it" when judges voted against them in favor of two weaker teams, to keep them from going to the State. Pittsburg, second place winner here, went on to win the State Tournament. However during the year Coffeyville met Pitt seven times and won five of the seven, which well shows the calibre of this years squad.















The Golden Tornado


The 1959-60 Golden Tornado football team finished its season with a very commendable record of six wins and three losses, no loss being by more than seven points. The Tornado defeated a new non-conference edition to their schedule, a very capable Nowata team by a score of 14-12. In an other non-league game Coffeyville was defeated, 21 to 14, by an always rugged Joplin Eagle eleven. The McWhirtmen won several thrillers this season. Most notable was at Pittsburg in which the Tornado came from behind to score 13 points in the final stanza, the last score being made with just 23 seconds remaining on the clock, defeating the Purple Dragons by a score of 13-12. Coffeyville was fortunate in having four of their members chosen to the all-S.E.K. team. They were Tyrone Hollins, Dale Warner, David Schichtle, and Gordon Howard. Dale Warner was also selected to the first team of the Topeka Daily Capital's All-State Squad.

Track

The 1960 track season opened with 65 candidates vieing for positions on head coach Oren Stoner and assistant coach Don McWhirt's Golden Tornado track squad. With sixteen lettermen returning and a promising group of sophomores, the outlook was bright.
