Turning in commendable records as members of the debate squad were Bradley Jesson, Betty Hayden and Bob Kloehr.





Clyde Martin, a member of the debate team, won the oration contest. Shirley Gooding took first in the "I Speak for Democracy" contest.


Attending the royalty were Jean Roles, (football), Mary Ann Beeman and Ann Ball (basketball).

The climax of the year was when the juniors invited the seniors to board the "Good Ship Field Kindley", which was decorated in blue and white, for the annual reception and dance.










The sophomores were very proud to have 50 on the semester honor roll with 19 of that number qualified for Sigma Pi, the high honor society.





The following week the Coffeyville team journeyed to faroff Ft. Scott to come from behind and win 18-7.

The Bartlesville Wildcats and Chanute Comets became victims of the Tornado onslaught in games in which the scores stood 27-7 and 18-7, respectively.

A decisive 26-7 victory over the favored Pittsburg Dragons put Coffeyville on top. The club then drubbed the Iola Mustangs, 39-0, and were ready for the championship battle with their ancient rivals, Independence. The bangup ball game, which was the best the Bulldogs had played all year, terminated in a 14-14 tie. However, this was all that was necessary for the Kindley crew to claim the S.E.K. League championship.

Harold Thomas and Dick Andrews were picked for the SEK squad with George Hafford and Bill Tipton receiving honorable mention.




Track


At the time this copy went to press the Tornado trackmen were preparing to attend the regional and the state meets. By the recent showings it can be judged that Coffeyville will make a good record.





The senior boys attended the American Royal Livestock Show at Kansas City.


