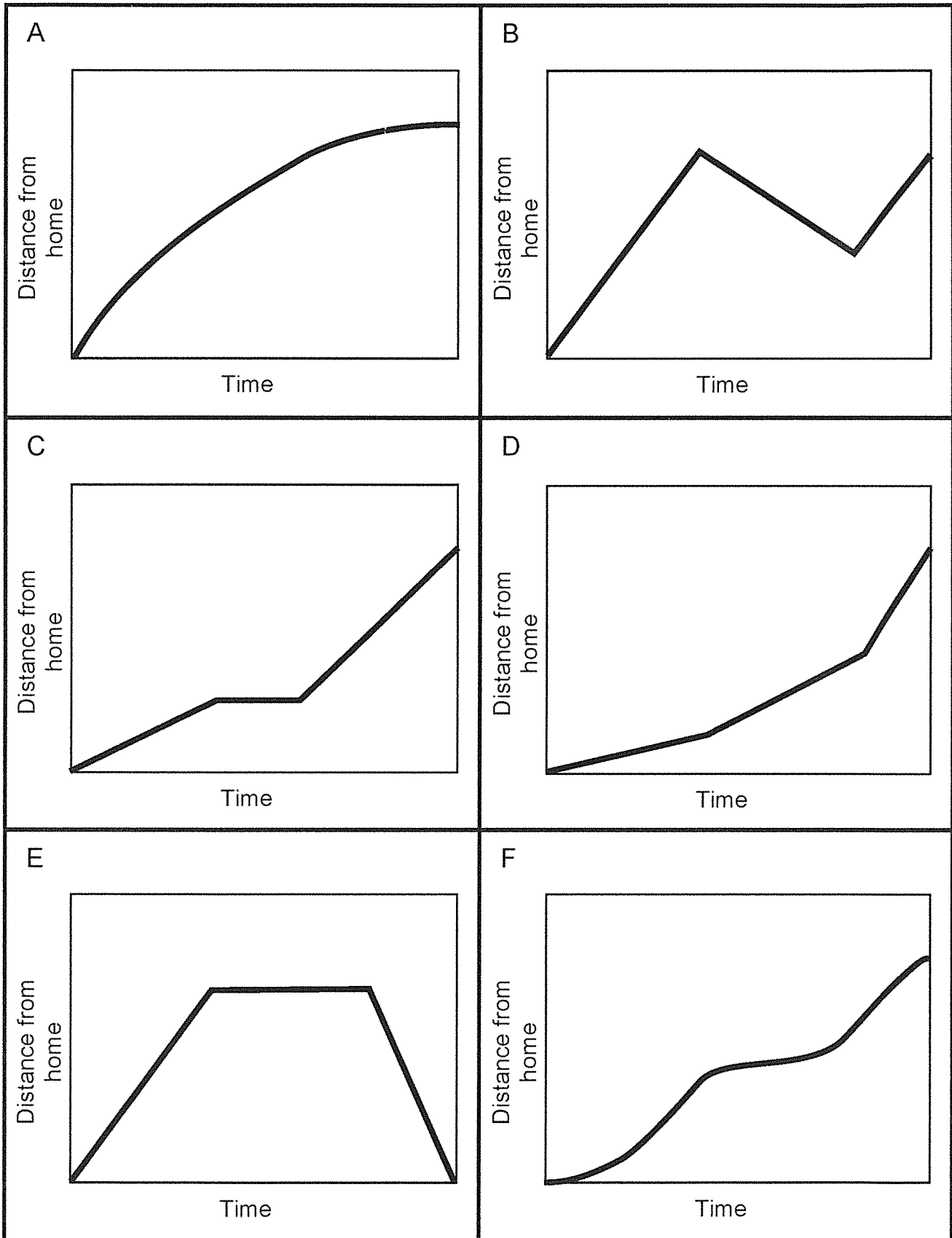
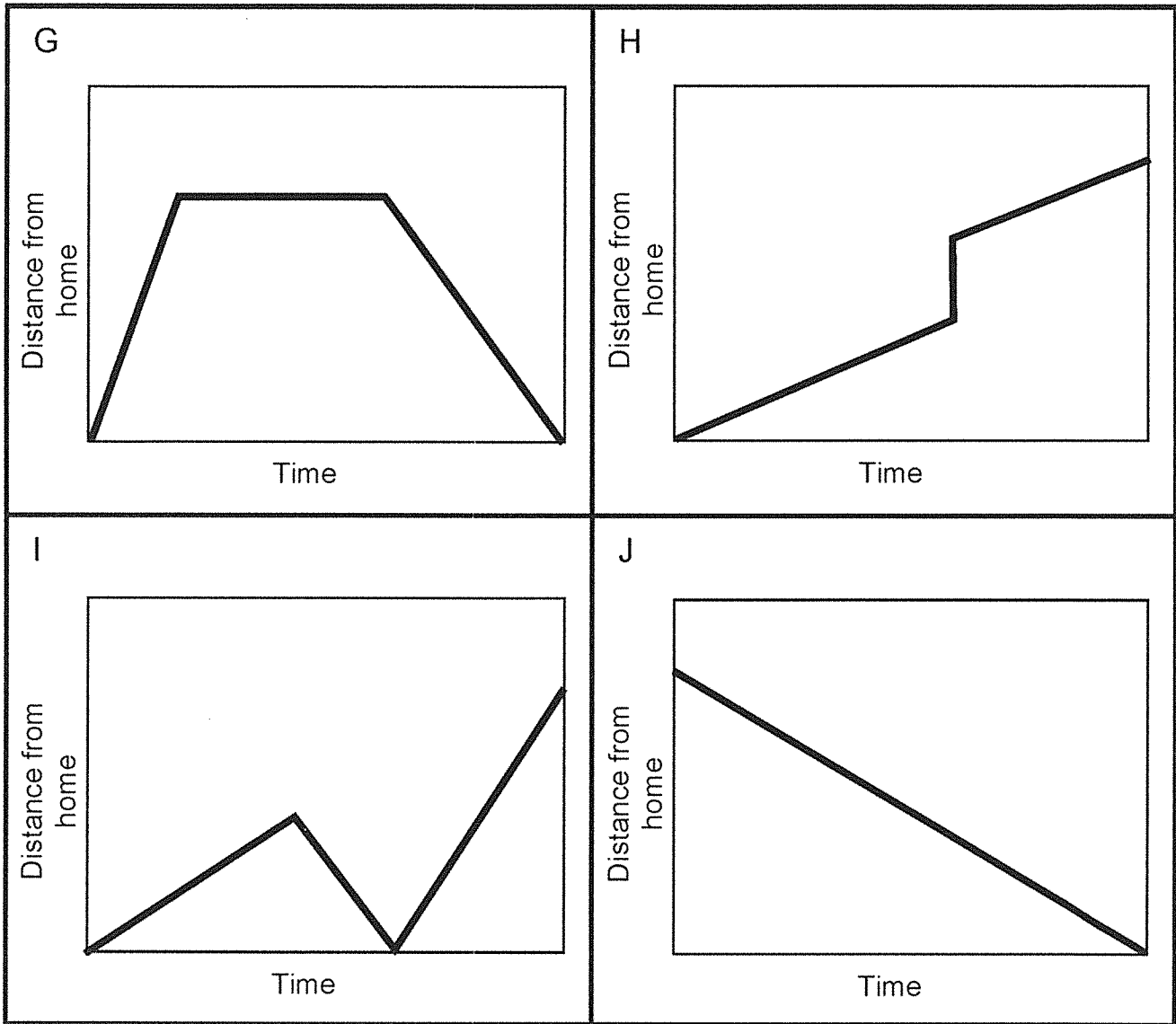

## Card Set B: Interpretations
