MATH FESTIVAL

On January 12th, 2015, the day we returned from our winter break, the California Mathematics Council came to Serrania CES to lead the first Serrania 'Math Festival' – an exciting school-wide event designed to expose students, teachers, and parents to key mathematics topics in a positive, self-exploratory, festival-like atmosphere – a program that's not only educational, but fun as well!

Throughout the day, classes were called to the auditorium, given a brief introduction and then presented with challenging puzzles and problems to solve. Additionally, several multi-grade and highly interactive stations were set up featuring activities such as *Broken Calculator*, *What's Missing*, and *In One Minute*. Worksheets of increasing difficulty were offered at each of these stations so students could find tasks that most suited them. Best of all, the students were given the freedom to choose any station they wanted while a core group of teachers and parent volunteers guided them through each entertaining activity.

Throughout the day, students approached the tables with great enthusiasm and found themselves conquering challenging tasks while having fun... surprising many of the students (and their teachers) by just how much they enjoyed the event. After about 30 minutes, students were sent back to class but were invited to come back after school with their parents. We're happy to report a great turnout of Serrania families assembled later in the evening in the auditorium to share the experience with their children – with some parents surprised to find themselves enjoying the challenges just as much as their kids. A digital copy of all the materials has been made available to the school and teachers for use in the classroom throughout the year.

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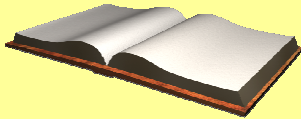

When and How Should We Start Talking About Drugs and Alcohol?

Whether you know it or not, you have been talking with your children about drugs and alcohol since they were little. The first time you gave them cough medicine or acetaminophen for a fever, you started having this conversation. The first time you had a glass of wine, you started having this conversation. These have all been teachable moments. So the conversation you are worried about having, started a long time ago.

The statistics according to "Liberty Mutual Group" are astounding:

- The average age of initiation to drugs is thirteen years old.
- One in six middle school students has smoked marijuana.
- 34 percent of teens cite "having fun" as the reason to use drugs.

Seven years of "Teen Today" research highlights the influential role of trusted adults in guiding teen behavior. This research shows that children want to talk about the choices they face, what parents' expectations are for them, and how they will be held accountable for their actions. Yet 11 percent of teens say their parents know of their drug use, but still do nothing!

So what can we do about it?

Seek out teachable moments in everyday life. When you're watching TV or see a person with a cigarette, talk about smoking, nicotine and addiction. If you have a glass of wine at a restaurant, ask your spouse to drive home since you had a drink. Discuss how drugs and alcohol affect the brain and body. Children are curious and the more hard evidence you can use to help educate them, the more effective your message can be.

Studies show that when parents have active, ongoing discussions with their children about these different behaviors, their children are more likely to feel comfortable discussing these topics with them. 97 percent of teens say it's important to live up to their parents' expectations regarding drug use, yet 31 percent say their parents never tell them what those expectations are! Don't worry about saying the wrong thing. Just find a way to let them know what values are important to you.

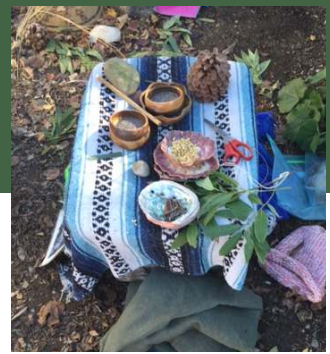


This past January, and every year for the last eight years, an authentic Chumash Village has been brought to life for our 3rd grade students by the *Camino Real Naturalist and Historical Interpreters*, a hands-on living history program. Students got to hear, taste, smell, feel and see what it was like to be part of a Chumash village life.

The program focused on the Chumash Indians use of natural materials, and included many wonderful activities. Kids got to grind acorn to make acorn flour, use 'fire drills' in an attempt to make fire, and make

Pictograph "rock" necklaces. They even got to taste plants used for food by our local Chumash Indians as well as learning about their medicinal uses. Students were also taught traditional Chumash songs and given the chance to play authentic Chumash musical instruments, manufacture stone bowls and even make sting from a Yucca plant.

Wonderful programs such as this transform our school into an amazing place of learning and fun... and interactive learning experiences create lasting impressions and foster a hunger to learn more about history and other cultures. Thanks again to all of our fantastic 3rd grade teachers for giving our kids such an amazing experience.
