CELEBRATING A DECADE OF PARTNERSHIP WITH UNIVERSITY OF CHICAGO MEDICINE

This year marks a milestone with one of the Corporate Work Study Program's (CWSP) long-term job partners, The University of Chicago Medicine (UCM). They have put a team of students to work in Occupational Medicine (OM) since the fall of 2004.

Three students assist the busy office with health screening documents for hospital employees, scan charts, complete data entry projects, prepare mail and blood work for delivery and pickups, confirm patient appointments, assist with mailings, and even fit employees with respiratory masks to protect them while at work.

Tedi Cohen has supervised Cristo Rey students in OM for several years, and many of her student workers stay at UCM all four years of high school. In fact, she has been honored several times as a "four-year supervisor" at an annual spring luncheon reflecting mutual high praise for the students and their supervisor.

As a ten-year partner of the Corporate Work Study Program, the University of Chicago Medicine received a plaque that depicts a mural which is on the outside of the Cristo Rey building. This artwork reflects the life of the students and their culture and was commissioned in 2006 to honor the school's tenth anniversary. More than 35% of the current job partners have provided jobs to Cristo Rey students for ten or more years, a clear indication of the strong relationships developed in the history of Cristo Rey's CWSP.

In the fall of 2014, UCM's Supply Chain department hired student workers as well. It is a real testament to the students and supervisors when a partner expands the program to other departments. Working in a hospital is a great experience for students. Not only are they exposed to careers in health care – they are contributing to their work places in tangible ways. The combination of a dedicated supervisor and eager students ready to learn creates a meaningful program. UCM is an excellent example of how students are filling important roles at many area hospitals, including: Advocate (Christ Medical Center, Condell Medical Center, Good Samaritan Hospital, Lutheran General Hospital), Ann & Robert H. Lurie Children's Hospital, Loyola Medicine, Northwestern Medicine and Presence Saints Mary and Elizabeth Medical Center. Students work across all departments: Human Resources, Information Technology, Marketing, Reception, Nutrition, Records, Purchasing, Facilities, and more.

Through the Corporate Work Study Program, students job-share a position with employers throughout Chicagoland to earn their high school tuition. Employers are able to fill an entry-level position at a competitive cost with well-trained students while enhancing diversity and talent pipelines. In return, students gain valuable on-the-job experience in highly professional settings. APPLYING MATH SKILLS OUTSIDE OF THE CLASSROOM

The first year of the Cristo Rey Magnetar Investment Academy was a success! A group of twenty sophomores and juniors stayed after school every Thursday in order to learn and apply concepts about saving, investing, and overall financial planning. The curriculum was developed by Magnetar Capital in order to engage youth in financial planning and prepare them for the future. Students study financial lifecycle and planning, general financial management, investing and the stock market, and building a financial portfolio. Moderators and math teachers, Amanda Burke and Kate Schulte, decided to bring the program to Cristo Rey in order to bridge the gap between the mathematics classroom and the real world. The Investment Club seemed like a great way for students to apply concepts from the math classroom and their work-study jobs.



In their first year competing in the Magnetar Academy Team Challenge, Cristo Rey students placed eighth out of thirty high schools.

Upon completion of the Magnetar Academy curriculum, students received a \$100 grant to open a Schwab One/Custodial Brokerage Investment Account where they invested in stocks, bonds, and mutual funds using the lessons they learned as a Magnetar student. In addition to the curriculum, ten students were chosen to compete in the Magnetar Academy Team Challenge on March 7th at Soldier Field. Cristo Rey competed against thirty other schools throughout the Chicagoland area. The competition tested the students' knowledge of the curriculum as well as their ability to think on their feet and build the best \$100,000 portfolio in three rounds.

Before each round, students were given economic indicators for an actual historical period from the stock market and were asked to build a portfolio within different sectors of the market. Anticipation was high during the competition, but Cristo Rey students were determined to crack the top ten. After a fierce competition, Cristo Rey won eighth place and successfully determined the best possible investment for their portfolio. The students were thrilled with this result and cannot wait to return next year. Congratulations to the team!

Students also had the opportunity to hear from Akbar Gbaja-Biamila, former NFL player and current host of American Ninja Warrior, who shared what he learned about spending and saving money throughout his career. In the future, Cristo Rey hopes to expand the program and to continue to give students the opportunity to apply mathematics concepts in a real world setting.

The first day I was nervous and followed our instructions strictly. On the second day, I was a little more relaxed and followed the process of the retreat in my own way. I gained

I was so afraid I would not be able to gain their trust; but here they were trusting me and trusting each other. We were able to talk to each other and strengthen our relationships with God.

In my first Kairos, I learned how to see God and forgive. In my second Kairos, I got to experience God working through me for others. As I reflect on my experience as a Kairos leader, I think that I fulfilled my mission to give back and make a difference in someone's life.

STUDENTS ATTEND SOCIAL JUSTICE CONFERENCE IN WASHINGTON, DC

On November 14, a delegation of eight Cristo Rey students joined over 1,600 members of the Ignatian family for an inspirational weekend at the 17th Annual Ignatian Family Teach-In for Justice (IFTJ). The IFTJ is a nationwide social justice conference sponsored by the Ignatian Solidarity Network, an organization that works to mobilize Jesuit institutions and ministries in order to affect positive social change on critical issues facing the world. Cristeros started networking even before they arrived at the conference, bonding with like-minded students from Christ the King, St. Martin de Porres, St. Ignatius, and Loyola Academy during the 12 hour bus ride to Washington.

From keynote speakers to breakout sessions, students explored topics including liberation theology, global peacemaking, feminism, climate change, and the legacy of the Jesuit martyrs of El Salvador. Students met with a staffer in the office of Representative Luis Gutierrez to advocate for comprehensive

immigration reform, responsible foreign policy in Central America, and environmental justice at the legislative level. The Cristo Rey delegation was especially impacted by the words of a college student whose journey to justice began when his birth mother left him on the steps of a church in Vietnam: "Not everything that grows in a garden is a flower."

The student's speech reminded the audience that there are multiple sides to every story; if we are to maintain any hope for change, we must learn to adopt an attitude of listening and analyze the world from different perspectives. The Cristo Rey group returned to Chicago eager to continue the process of uprooting injustice, sowing truth, and witnessing transformation in their own communities.

Throughout the month of February, teach-in participants sponsored an Ignatian Family Advocacy Month at Cristo Rey in order to support works of social justice that can help change American policy. IFTJ participants discussed social justice topics and offered educational materials during school lunches. This opportunity for students to explore social justice themes is just one of many service opportunities that enable our students to live out their commitment as "men and women for others."
